

Bolton EDC Survey

January/February, 2011

Background

- Bolton's Economic Development Committee was formed to provide Bolton with recommendations and guidance for the future economic development of the town.
- In addition to holding a series of public forums to gather input from the town, they wanted to reach out to the entire community for input.
- It was decided to conduct an online survey to solicit input on a variety of high-level topics to help guide their work.

How the Study was Done

- An invitation to the survey was mailed with the annual town census which goes to all households in Bolton.
- The survey was available either online or by hard copies made available at the Town Hall, the Senior Center, and the Bolton Public Library.
- The survey was available for completion from the beginning of January until the middle of February.

Contents of the Survey

- Questions were asked about:
 - Type of economic development desired
 - Possible locations for economic development
 - Economic development along Main Street in the center of town
 - Reaction to a possible village overlay around Rtes.. 117 and 495
 - Questions about business development and the impact on property taxes

Bolton's Response

- 547 people responded to the survey, representing 779 adults.
- Of those who started the survey, 95%+ completed it.
- 239 respondents wrote open-ended responses to further clarify their opinions

Data Weighting

- Respondent ages were fairly representative of the town, except that those between the ages of 18 and 44 were underrepresented
- Data used in the final analysis are NOT weighted by age as a trial weighting did not change the results in any significant way.
- Data ARE weighted to represent total individuals as roughly 1/3 of respondents answered for all adults in their household. These respondents were weighted according the the number of adults in their household and those who answered for only themselves were given a weight of one.

Summary of Results

- There is a strong wish for the committee to work to fill the current empty business space in town.
- Overall support for additional economic development is mixed.
- Most people would prefer no major retail development in the center of town along Main Street

 preferring either none at all or only small retail shops.

Summary: Cont.


- There is strong support for a village overlay in the 495 area with some reservations about what the guidelines will be.
- People are not clear as to whether further business will help mitigate property taxes or not they want actual data. Those who are most opposed to additional business are most likely to believe it won't help with taxes.
- There is confusion about the role of the Economic Development Committee.

There is Less Agreement about Main Street in the Historic District




Desirable Retail Services are Mostly Food Related

Current Opinion About the Impact of Added Business on Taxes is Mixed



Three Attitudinal Groups Emerged


- "Bring it On:
 - Strongly supportive of additional business in town
- "Leave Bolton Alone:
 - Quite resistant to any further business development in town
- "Qualified Support:
 - Supportive, but with significant reservations

The Size of each the Three Groups




Percent of Respondents


Support by Group for Locations of Business Zoning (% Agreeing)


The Leave Bolton Alone Group is More Skeptical about any Tax Benefits from New Business


The Hypothetical Scenarios

To Recap: The Overall Message to the EDC Committee is:

- Clarify your mission
- Focus first on filling current empty business space
- Village overlay at 495 is fine if it "fits" the town
- Make no major changes to Main Street in the center of town
- Don't allow any major chains or large retail businesses – especially in the center of town

To Recap: The Overall Message to the EDC Committee is:

- Each of the three groups needs to have their concerns addressed in any committee proposals
- It's not clear to folks what impact, if any, business development will have on residential real estate taxes
- Keep taxes flat: town needs to reign in spending in all areas not just seek additional sources of revenue
