TRIPS

Trips require a minimum of 30 to 45 seniors. Tour companies cancel trips if minimum is not met. In most cases, the trip money is due one month prior to the trip to guarantee your seat on the bus. Payments are needed in advance. There are no refunds to "No Shows" on the day of the trip. Cancellations, depending on how far in advance they are given, may incur a penalty or loss of your total payment unless we can fill the seat from a waiting list or the trip is cancelled. All checks should be made payable to Senior Citizens Association. Our neighboring town seniors are always welcome on our trips if there are seats available on the bus. The town of Bolton subsidizes the bus cost, therefore, Bolton seniors have precedence over neighboring town residents. We sincerely apologize to our senior neighbors, but due to budget restraints, we charge you an additional \$5.00 on all trips.

WHEAT COMMUNITY CAFE'



SHINE (Serving the Health Information of Elders) is coordinated by the Massachusetts Executive Office of Elder Affairs in partnership with the Friends of the Milford Senior Center, The Massachusetts Councils on Aging, and other local agencies.







Hogan to Speak on State Preps for Wild Weather

Mass. State Rep. Kate Hogan will be on hand to introduce the Bolton Local program, "Sandy's Sister is Coming to Town," **Thursday, April 18, at 7 p.m**. at the Bolton Public Library. Hogan will discuss a report the Legislature requested about a Massachusetts response to recent extreme weather events like Superstorm Sandy.

Community leaders and community members alike are encouraged to attend this important program, which will present information about what is being done or discussed at state and local levels to evaluate the risks from increasingly volatile weather patterns.

Other speakers include:

Kathleen M. Baskin, director of Water Policy in the Massachusetts Executive Office of Energy and Environment, who will speak about key findings and recommended actions in the Massachusetts Climate Change Adaptation Report produced by an advisory panel of that office.

Mark Sandeen, Sustainable Lexington leader, who will discuss what that group has done to assess what the escalating weather intensity could mean to their community.

There will be an opportunity for discussion and brainstorming following the program.

State Budget Priorities for Fiscal Year 2013

At the end of April, the House of Representatives will debate the State Budget for Fiscal Year 2014. As Co-Chair of the Elder Caucus, I worked with Rep. Matthew Beaton, other legislators, and advocates to present the four most important budgetary priorities for seniors to the chair of the House Committee on Ways and Means. The Elder Caucus is advocating an end to waitlists for seniors qualified for home care services and working to prevent federal cuts from affecting seniors in Massachusetts. Our additional priorities include:

- Elder Protective Services: The protective services program investigates and resolves elder abuse and neglect and often deals with very complex and volatile family situations. Elder abuse is also more prevalent in a down economy: currently in Massachusetts there are 54 new reports of elder abuse each day. It is imperative that our seniors receive the legal and protective services that they need. Currently, local ASAPs must take funding from other accounts in order to cover the legal costs required for elder protective services.
- Local Aid to Councils on Aging: Local councils on aging provide invaluable services and resources to the elders in our communities. The Elder Caucus has requested an increase in this line item to raise the formula allocation to \$8 per elder / per year.
- **Home Health Care:** The home care purchased services and home care management line items help our elders avoid premature institutionalization. Providing resources to keep elders in their own homes is the right thing to do.
- Adult Day Health Programs: Adult Day Health Programs are designed to meet the physical, functional, and social needs of elderly and disabled adults who are unable to live entirely independent. These programs provide nursing care in community settings to people with significant medical needs so that they can avoid hospitalization or nursing home placement. These programs save money as nursing home care costs upwards of \$60,000 per person yearly on Medicaid, while Adult Day Health Programs cost \$15,000 per person yearly. Bolton Townwide Yard Sale Announced

Despite what you might see outside your window, spring is almost here, and that means the annual Bolton Townwide Yard Sale is just around the corner! The 2013 Townwide Yard Sale, sponsored by Bolton Local, will take place Saturday, May 4, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. (Rain date May 5). **This sales opportunity is open to Bolton residents only,** but draws buyers from near and far.

This year there will be three "group" locations—Bolton Orchards, at the corner of routes 117 and 110; Slater's, 356 Main Street (Route 117); and Firewater and Wine on Forbush Mill Road. At these group sites sellers can set up tables in a 10 x 10-foot space for no additional fee. People with small, easily-transportable items to sell, or organizations looking to run a yard sale as a fundraiser, might want to choose one of these central locations.

The cost to participate in the yard sale is \$5, which buys sellers a spot on the map that will be available in several locations around town on the day before the sale to direct shoppers to all the sales. Sellers will also get a line of copy on the map to highlight special items they are selling. The participation fee covers publicity and advertising in Bolton and surrounding communities, as well as the cost of the maps.

Each seller can also sign up to be a "10-percent house," committing on the honor system to donate 10 percent of proceeds to a local cause or favorite charity. "10-percent houses" will be noted on the map. Last year more than \$800 was donated to local causes.

Signup forms are available on the Bolton Local website, www.BoltonLocal.org, and at the Bolton Public Library. To register, complete the form and send along with your check, payable to Bolton Local, to Mary Boyd, 350 Still River Road, Bolton, MA 01740.

Signup deadline is March 30. (After March 30, if there is still space available on the map, signups will be accepted until April 13, for a fee of \$10.)
